\$6 million gift will support cardiovascular research, education and patient care



Sarah and John Lechleiter turned their personal story into one of broad impact with a \$6 million commitment to support cardiovascular surgical care, research and developing the next generation of surgical innovators at Indiana University Health and the Indiana University School of Medicine. At the time, the gift was the largest philanthropic gift ever shared by the health system and the medical school, an indication of the institutions' continued collaboration.

The Lechleiters' gift will support:

- Innovative approaches to improve patient care
- Development of distinctive, innovative programs for Indiana University
- A new faculty chair in cardiovascular surgery innovation

- Research, quality and innovation work in the Cardiovascular Institute
- Training the next generation of surgeonscientists focused on innovation in cardiovascular surgery

The couple credits IU Health for saving John's life in 2013 when he underwent open heart surgery to repair an aneurysm. Their gift also supports new research at a school that's already challenging paradigms in areas such as the treatment of patients recovering from heart attacks and developing an Aortic Surgery Center of Excellence where team members will work to develop a new heart pump.

Innovative device supports nurses and patients across southcentral Indiana

One in four IU Health team members is a nurse - keeping nurses safe is paramount.

One of the activities that most threatens that safety is the six to 10 times each day a patient must be repositioned, a heavy burden that falls on our nursing staff.

Thanks to philanthropic support, technology reduces that burden significantly. 211 Hercules Patient Repositioners were installed across Indiana's south region in December 2024 thanks to donors passionate about improving the patient and team member experience in Bloomington and beyond. And the response has been enthusiastic, as reflected in patient and caregiver satisfaction ratings, as well as the following comments from our nurses:

- "The Hercules is such a game-changer for all the units. So many staff members have commented on how amazing this is."
- "It's a blessing to have the ability to do my job more effectively."
- "I feel patients are being cared for quicker, and they're more comfortable, which makes them nicer to us."


the Difference's first donor, Shelly Schwarz, marking a full-circle moment in the Foundation's growth.

Cancer patient's daughter donates bell to IU Health Arnett Hospital

"Ringing bells is often associated with significant events," said Dr. Matthew Orton, an oncologist at IU Health. "This donation allows us to bring that celebration - that joy and that experience - to our patients."

When Jack Connaughton finished his last radiation treatment at the IU Health Lafayette Cancer Center, he left the doctor's office without fanfare. His daughter, Stacey, saw that as a missed opportunity to recognize a milestone for anyone on a cancer journey. Through IU Health Foundation, she donated a bell to the cancer center. In the oncology world, patients often ring a bell to symbolize completion of treatment.

"When my daughter told her mother and I about the gift to create the bell," Connaughton said, "I felt like it was a great way to pay it forward after the great treatment I received."

ALL THE DIFFERENCE FOR FORT WAYNE

Building on our promise: IU Health breaks ground on Fort Wayne Hospital

In July 2024, IU Health announced a \$421 million investment in Fort Wayne, six years after opening its first primary care location on the city's south side. The new hospital, slated to open in 2027, will employ 500 team members and bring 60 additional providers to meet the diverse healthcare needs of the Fort Wayne community. While IU Health Foundation does not raise money

for capital projects, philanthropy will be critical to supporting patients, the clinical programs and initiatives at the new hospital.

The new hospital will feature:

- 140 beds
- 17 emergency department exam rooms
- Six operating rooms
- Three catheterization labs for advanced cardiac procedures
- Four endoscopy rooms for diagnostic and therapeutic procedures

ALL THE DIFFERENCE FOR INFANTS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Supporting NICU care in Indiana's East Region

June Scheumann's \$1 million gift to support the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at IU Health Ball Memorial Hospital was matched by IU Health to bring \$2 million in support of infant and maternal health to east-central Indiana. The gift will have a wide reach as IU Health Ball serves nine counties. June's generosity was an expression of gratitude for the care the Scheumann family received at the hospital. Two Scheumann grandchildren spent time in the NICU after they were born.

"The nurses who cared for our family were just fabulous," June said. "We want anyone who delivers at Ball to have the same chances of survival. It means a lot to make sure this care is available close to home."

ALL THE DIFFERENCE FOR EARLY DETECTION

Indiana's first mobile lung screening program drives access to life-saving care

Thanks to a \$4.5 million gift from the Tom and Julie Wood Family Foundation, matched by IU Health, a large truck has been retrofitted with a CT scanner and other components needed to conduct lung screenings. Now the truck and its mobile team are cruising across Indiana to provide these important tests to Hoosiers who might not otherwise have access to them.

By supporting both patient care and research efforts, the program leverages the collaboration between IU Health and the Indiana University Melvin and Bren Simon Comprehensive Cancer Center.

"Lung cancer screening unequivocally saves lives by catching the disease in its earliest and most treatable stages," said Dr. Nasser Hanna, the Tom and Julie Wood Family Foundation Professor of Lung Cancer Clinical Research at IU School of Medicine and an IU Health lung cancer physician. "All of us at the IU Simon Comprehensive Cancer Center and IU Health know how valuable these painless and safe imaging tests will be for those at risk of lung cancer - especially those who face barriers to accessing such screenings."



Community event raises \$50,000 toward ALS patient care

While watching his mother endure a long battle with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) that would eventually take her life, IU Health board member Mike Fitzgerald and his wife decided to launch a nonprofit with a two-part mission: funding research to find a cure and caring for patients. The Fitzgeralds knew firsthand the toll ALS takes on patients and their caregivers.

And, as friends with the owners of The Vogue Theatre in Indianapolis, they had an idea for an event they dubbed Madness at The Vogue.

"One of my favorite days of the year is the first day of the NCAA basketball tournament," Fitzgerald said. "They shut down the venue for the day and help us set up a private event. We sell tables. We have sponsors and food partners. We pull big TVs in and watch games all day long. In the middle, we turn down the volume, hop on stage and remind people why we're there with a couple auction items."

In addition to being grateful for the support of friends, Fitzgerald – co-founder and partner at High Alpha – also credits Madness at The Vogue's success to the local tech community's deep connection to Angie's List co-founder and local tech luminary Bill Oesterle. Oesterle, who passed away at 57 after his own battle with ALS, received his treatment at IU Health.

"Bill's endorsement led us to make this initial gift to IU Health Foundation in his honor," Fitzgerald said. "We feel the connection to IU Health gives us a good opportunity to have a steady presence in the work that's happening around ALS in our community."

ALL THE DIFFERENCE FOR WOMEN

Swifties raise more than \$330,000 in support of Healthier Women

When Taylor Swift rolled through Indianapolis for a concert, IU Health Foundation held a sweepstakes in which fans who donated \$100 in support of women's health programs were entered to win a pair of suite tickets to one of the sold-out shows. The sweepstakes generated 2,650 entries from 1,426 people. Thanks to a match from a generous donor, the total contributed to women's health initiatives was more than \$333,591.

Indiana ranks 36th overall in women's health outcomes. The donations received from the sweepstakes supported laser therapy treatment for breast cancer patients, the Path4You program which provides free birth control to women across the state, support for victims of sexual assault and more. Donations to the campaign for women's health programs aimed to change that statistic.

One sweepstakes winner entered the contest on behalf of his wife who works in genetic counseling at IU Health Simon Cancer Center (couple pictured right). "Obviously, with my wife being a genetic counselor who focuses on cancers like breast cancer, this campaign is a big deal," he said. "We have two young daughters, and we want to make sure they grow up healthy with all the opportunities they should have."



ALL THE DIFFERENCE FOR TRAUMA PATIENTS

Fueling a New Era

Presented by Fifth Third Bank and hosted at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the 11th Annual Rev event on May 4, 2024, raised more than \$3 million for trauma care at IU Health. IU Health Foundation's marquee event, Rev welcomed more than 3,700 VIP Elite and premiere guests, with tickets selling out in minutes. Led by honorary co-chairs Heather and Ed Carpenter, Rev 2024 supported:

- Statewide IU Health Trauma program

- Neurologist support for IndyCar Medical Team



ALL THE DIFFERENCE FOR NURSES

An update: Continued progress in Nursing Excellence, fueled by philanthropy

Recently, the 5North nursing team at IU Health Methodist Hospital celebrated 466 days without a hospital-acquired infection—a major win for patient safety. Beginning in 2024, this achievement stemmed from evidence-based practices aimed at reducing central line-associated bloodstream infections (CLABSI), which claim 28,000 lives annually in U.S. intensive care units, according to the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.

These efforts reflect the vision of Dr. Michelle Janney, retired Executive Vice President, Chief Operating Officer at IU Health and nurse by training. Her lead

gift established The Michelle A. Janney Center for Nursing Excellence, which supports and scales initiatives like this. Looking ahead, Executive Vice President and Chief Nurse Executive Jason Gilbert, Janney's successor, and his team led by Kady Martini plan to bring 1,200 nurses through intensive, weeklong trainings focused on evidence-based care.

Gilbert is committed to finding the next champion to build on this foundation. "I'm hoping for support from the Foundation and donors to keep these resources available," he said. "This is personal to me—it's where I direct all my giving. I've had incredible opportunities for career development, and this is my chance to give back." One thing is clear: when nurses have the right tools, training, and support, they don't just improve protocols—they transform lives.
