Food Allergens

Table listing various food allergens categorized by type: Food-Dairy, IgE; Food-Fruits, IgE; Food-Grains and seeds, IgE; Food-Meats, IgE; Food-Fish, IgE; Food-Nuts, IgE; Food-Shellfish, mollusks, IgE; Food-Vegetables, IgE; Food-Spices, IgE; Food-miscellaneous, IgE; and Other. Each entry includes the allergen name, a code, and a corresponding number.

The Choosing Wisely Campaign has the goal of advancing a national dialogue on avoiding wasteful/unnecessary medical tests and procedures. The number one listing from the 'Five Things Physicians and Patients Should Question' from the allergy specialists was the following: "Don't perform unproven diagnostic tests, such as immunoglobulin G (IgG) testing or an indiscriminate battery of immunoglobulin E (IgE) tests, in the evaluation of allergy." Food specific IgEs do not diagnose food allergy, only that an IgE antibody directed against a food is present.
