Application Requirements

The qualified applicant must possess a Doctor of Pharmacy Degree from an accredited college of pharmacy and must be eligible for Indiana licensure. Completion of a prior ASHP accredited PGY1 residency is required. All offers are contingent upon a background check, reference check, and preplacement health assessment, which includes a drug test. If selected for an on-site or virtual interview, a presentation will be required.

All program specific requirements.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Serve on a Pediatric or Academic Workgroup Committee by attending 80% of the meetings• Participate in at least one practice management initiative affecting the pediatric population at Indiana University Health• Complete a clinical review, case report, or case series manuscript with preparation for journal submission• Successfully complete 10 out of 12 rotations including all required rotations• Complete a research project with manuscript and presented it at a national meeting• Complete all the PGY2 pediatric appendix required patient experiences and topic discussions
